#### **Chinese Studies Symposium**

Oct. 3, 2014

The Center for Chinese Studies (CCS) held the "Presentations of MOFA Taiwan Fellowship Scholars" for the third quarter of 2014. Four scholars were invited to present their research findings to an audience of over 100 scholars from Taiwan and 20 other countries. Intense discussions and exchanges of ideas marked the presentations on Taiwan's foreign policy. In the end, there was an overall optimism regarding Taiwan's future.

The first presenter was Prashant Kumar Sing, an associate research fellow in India's Institute of Defense Studies & Analyses, who spoke on "India-Taiwan Relations: Enhancing People-to-People Relations." He believes that public diplomacy can side-step sensitive issues of autonomy in a wonderfully efficient way without adversely affecting the "One China" foreign policy of India. This, he holds, is the best means for establishing good relations with Taiwan.

The second presenter was Marcin Gornikiewicz, a post-doctorate researcher at the National Defense Research Center in Poland's Stanislaw Staszic College of Public Administration. He cited Taiwan's Sunflower Student Movement and Hong Kong's Occupy Central with Love and Peace Movement as examples in discussing "The PRC's Soft Power Methodology: Why It Didn't Work in Democratic Societies."

The third presenter was Lin Goethals, an assistant research fellow at Belgium's European Institute for Asia Studies. She spoke on "The Role of Higher Education and Exchange Programmes in EU-Taiwan Relations." Goethals argued that Taiwan diplomacy successfully improved EU-Taiwan relations via scholarly exchanges in higher education. However, in comparison to traditional economic trade diplomacy, the education model is more limited in its effectiveness.

The final presenter was Richard Turcsanyi, a Ph.D. candidate at the Institute of Asia Studies in Slovakia. He spoke on "What Power Politics? The Nature of Power Relations in the East Asia and the Position of the Republic of China (Taiwan)." He described
