# ■National Taiwan Library Holds Press Conference after Concluding 2014 Augmenting Use of E-books for the Visually Impaired Midterm Project

To announce the successful completion of its project to improve the use of e-books for the visually impaired, National Taiwan Library held a press conference on December 18. It revealed its newly developed app: Audio for the Visually Impaired. It also recognized publishers YLib, Linking Books, and Puomo, as well as the National Museum of Taiwan Literature and New Taipei City's Cultural Affairs Department for donating e-book files. Awards were also given to five finalists and one honorable mention in this year's Visual and Hearing Impaired Outstanding Thesis and Dissertation Award.

## New Main Kaohsiung Public Library Open for Use

The new main Kaohsiung Public Library opened its doors on November 13. Mayor Chu Chen cut the ribbon with the public, signifying the opening of a gift that was given to the residents of the city. The new library is spacious and bright inside, with 1,600 seats spread throughout the building. It also has many works of art on display, including a public art wall and bust of Da Vinci made from old books and texts, giving patrons a great place not only to read, but also to enjoy art.

## Toufen Township Library Remodels, Boasts New 5-Star Reading Space

The Toufen Township Library, located in Miaoli County, is currently remodeling to provide a better reading environment for patrons. Changes will be completed in November, including separating study and reading areas, making reading areas more spacious and comfortable, and relocating the administration offices to the basement. The first floor will house a children's reading area and a preschool treehouse reading area. The second floor will house the stacks and the multimedia area. It will also have a discussion area for youth, in an attempt to promote the reading atmosphere.

## Tainan City Tries Convenient Store Book Return Service in Anding Area

The Anding District Office in Tainan is teaming up with FamilyMart convenient stores to provide a book-return service called "Schedule Online, Return at FamilyMart". All one needs to do is schedule a return on the library's website, then take the library book to FamilyMart to return it. In the six months the project has been in operation, over 4,000 people have used it. Project coordinators are now looking at the possibility of offering a check out service as well.

## ■ National Chiao Tung University Library First to Offer 3D Printing Services

National Chiao Tung University Library is the first to house a 3D printer in its facilities. It is open to students and the public. All that's needed is a little creativity, a 3D model using computer software, then send the file to the library's 3D printing service website (http://print3d.lib.nctu.edu.tw). The site will calculate the time and cost needed to print the design. Once the printing cost is paid, the printer starts printing. Completed prints can be picked up at the library.
