### ■ The Establishment of the “National Federation of Taiwan Theses and Dissertations E-databases”

On November 6, the NCL, combining with university libraries established the “National Federation of Taiwan Theses and Dissertations E-databases” in view of having a complete collection of the bibliographic data and electronic full text of national theses and dissertations to permanently preserve domestic academic research and to promote global knowledge sharing.

Besides presenting the main directions of cooperation, the current Federation General Assembly also elected 19 representatives from libraries to make up the “Development Committee”.

Also invited for the meeting were Hao-ren Ke, University Librarian of National Taiwan Normal University and a colleague from the NCL who pointed out the significance of the establishment of the Federation and strategies for future cooperation development. In the discussion were pointed out the eventual participation of university libraries from Hong Kong, Macao and Mainland China in the federation, the application of administrative work, the forms of database vendors cooperation and other related issues.

### ■ The First Golden Information Awards

In an effort to increase civil servants’ ability to resolve issues by searching NCL databases for information, on November 16, 2015 the NCL hosted the first “Golden Information Awards: National Competition of Library Information Literacy for Civil Servants.” Following the competition, awards were presented by Director General Tseng.

This competition saw questions based on the five main information systems created by the NCL: Index to Taiwan Periodical Literature System, National Digital Library of Theses and Dissertations in Taiwan, Taiwan Citation Index – Humanities and Social Sciences, Taiwan Memory, and NCL Gazette Online. Civil servants were divided into two groups: general (open to all civil servants) and professional (limited to librarians).

The top three from each group received awards. The silver medal for the professional group was awarded to a staff member from the NCL. In her remarks, Director General Tseng stated that information literacy is an important ability for civil servants, as they need to be able to fluently and effectively use library resources to find information required by their jobs and to increase the quality and effectiveness of their work. She also hopes that the contestants can go back and teach the people around them how to make use of library and information tools to find resources, thus increasing even further the overall ability of civil servants in this regard.

### ■ 2015 Taiwan Reading Festival

Two years ago the NCL began holding a Taiwan Reading Festival, which entails working with various schools, libraries, and educational institutions to put on many reading-promotion events. These are aimed to increase the amount of reading the public does.

The 3rd Taiwan Reading Festival was celebrated in a festive atmosphere on December 5, 2015 at the NCL and its surrounding area. The NCL held a press conference on November 23, wherein Director General Tseng explained the planned events to the public. The Ministry of Education (MOE) and collaborating organizations were in attendance to encourage the public to participate in the many events of the festival.

On the day of 2015 Taiwan Reading Festival, together with the reading festival was the awarding ceremony of National Public Libraries evaluation results. The celebration attracted more than 1,000 people.

The Minister of Education, Mr. Se-hwa Wu, attended this event. He congratulated the 143 public libraries who were awarded for their special features, their outstanding performance and other achievements. In his speech, Minister Wu pointed out that reading not only increases one's personal knowledge, reading every day also increases the continuous growth of brain cells and produces a more healthy life. He therefore encouraged everyone to read more and more.

Minister Wu also mentioned the present use of the library space which created an atmosphere that is different from the previous set up. He said that in the future, libraries will play a more important role expressing his hope that libraries manage further the reading community to encourage more and more people to read.
