Hsinchu (新竹) Girls' Senior High School, it was not until 1960 that she began writing Chinese poetry, publishing her first collection in 1977. In the 1980s, Du-Pan began to actively write poetry in Hakka, and from the 1990s, a large body of her work was published in collections such as *Chaoqing* (朝晴). In 2007, she received the Award for Outstanding Contribution from the Hakka Affairs Council, and the Award for Contribution to New Taiwanese Literature from the Council of Cultural Affairs.

Lecture on "World History of Illustration Art"


In an effort to promote the reading and art in illustrated books, on March 18 the NCL invited renowned Japanese illustrator Takeshi Matsumoto, who is also the creator of the first illustration gallery in the world, to speak on the "World History of Illustration Art." The speech included the origins and development

of illustration and its meaning to people.

Mr. Matsumoto stated illustration is a doorway that not only can lead people into the world of art but also into the world of literature. When reading illustrated books and looking for clues in the illustrations, readers can discover seasons, temperature, time, sound, smells, etc. The story unfolds through this interpretation and imagination. This is the way to read illustrated books—taking the time to notice the details of the illustrations, and from the details let one's imagination be sparked.
