anthology of Mr. Dongpo's Poetry, the only extant Song version of Commentaries of the Five Masters on Wenxuan; and a very rare hand-written copy by a Song official of The Veritable Records of the Song Emperor Taizong.

In addition, the NCL and the Pan Pacific Ocean Group jointly hosted the international conference on a "New Heritage in the Cloud age: Adding Value to and Interpreting Ancient Books" on April 19, 2018. Themes for discussion at the conference addressed four main topics as follows: Preservation and Culture Transmission of Ancient Books; Reprinting Ancient Books and Recreating Classics; Knowledge Construction of Ancient Books; Resources and Integrated Services for Ancient Books. It invited internationally renowned scholars and experts related to ancient books to participate, with 10 papers to be presented, while reproduced the value of ancient books, and enrich the 85th anniversary of the NCL.

The EARL is comprised of the Chinese Book Resource Center (Capital Library of China), the Japanese Book Resource Center (Japan Foundation), the Korean Book Resource Center (Korea Foundation), and the Taiwan Center for Chinese Studies (NCL). Each center provides books and digital resources published in its respective country, which support research and teaching needs by faculty and students at the university. The NCL signed two Memoranda of Understanding (MoU) with the UL on May 24, 2017. The first MoU established a Taiwan Resource Center for Chinese Studies (TRCCS), while the second invited the university to join the Combined Catalogue of Rare Books database.

## Israel Economic and Cultural Office Donates Books to the NCL

The opening ceremony

for the exhibition took place on June 1, and was cohosted by NCL Director-General Tseng Shu-hsin together with Representative of Czech Republic Vaclav Jilek and Representative of Slovak Republic Martin Podstavek.
