In celebration of the Mid-Autumn Festival, National Central Library (NCL) held a tea party for foreign visiting scholars on September 14 at the Nanhai Academy. The party was called "A Dialog between Tea and Music." More than 50 scholars in Taiwan on the Research Grant for Foreign Scholars in Chinese Studies or the Ministry of Foreign Affair's Taiwan Fellowship were invited to attend the festivities.

The event was hosted by Director-General Shuhsien Tseng. The Deputy Director-General Li-wei Sun of Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Department of Policy Planning and the Deputy Director Paoyueh Yen of Ministry of Education's Department of Lifelong Education also attended and gave remarks. The program included a performance of music and dance by the Youth Ambassadors, as well as the internationally-acclaimed I Wan Jan Puppet Theater which performed a traditional Taiwanese puppet show. It was hoped that these scholars would be able to experience common ways the Taiwanese celebrate the festival and the depth of traditional Chinese culture, and then to share those experiences with the world.
