# International Children's Book Day: The Minister of Education Calls for Parents to End Work Early and to Read to Their Children

April 2 is the birthday of the well-known children's author Hans Christian Andersen. It is also International Children's Book Day. The Minister of Education, Wen-chung Pan posted on his personal Facebook account on April 2 a call for parents to get off work early and to return home to read with their children.

This year is the first year that Taiwan has participated in International Children's Book Day. National Central Library invited renowned illustrator and author Mr. Bagel to design two posters, "Train a Little Book Lover in Your Life" and "Train a Little Book Lover in Your Family." These posters outline concrete ways parents can help their children develop "early literacy" abilities. Public libraries in Taiwan have in recent years set up baby and toddler reading areas, which provide a rich variety of age-specific

books, other media, and events. These areas let babies and toddlers experience and feel the joy of reading in an area all to themselves, providing an all-new experience of reading.

### National Taiwan Library Puts on "Joy in Diversity: Traversing a New Reading Field" Event

National Taiwan Library, in an effort to respond to new residents in Taiwan and to coordinate with the government's New Southbound Policy, has expanded its multicultural resource area. On June 15, 2019, it held a "Joy in Diversity: Traversing a New Reading Field" grand opening and book donation event. National Taiwan Library's multicultural resource center expanded from the four official languages in Taiwan to include seven other languages, such as Burmese, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Cambodian, and Malay, etc. It is estimated that the new holdings will number close to twenty thousand volumes.

The reading area also expanded from four to thirty-two seats and provides computer search capabilities to patrons. Through this opportunity to understand other cultures, the public's eyes can be further opened. It is hoped that the public can better understand the different cultures in Southeast Asia and can have a broader vision.
