## ■ International Book Donation Comes across the Ocean to NCL: NCL Receives Austrian Sinologist's Collection

National Central Library received a large donation of books from Austrian Sinologist Dr. Otto Ladstätter's (1933-2005) family. The shipment arrived in Taiwan on July 19, 2021, and on July 28 had cleared customs. NCL has started sorting through and cataloging the donated books. Beginning in September 2020, NCL Director-General Shu-hsien Tseng tried to seek opportunity to receive this precious collection, asking professor Fr. Luis Gutheinz and Monumenta Serica Sinological Research Center Director Dr. Mei-ting Huang of Fu-Jen Catholic University to intermediate with Dr. Otto Ladstätter's son, who is also a professor, to persuade him to donate the collection to NCL. Director-General Tseng explained that NCL has a Center for Chinese Studies that is continuously expanding its Chinese studies collection and offers research stipends to foreign scholars in researching topics in Chinese studies. The Center and its resources are highly valued by scholars in Taiwan and abroad. Indeed, it is an important hub for Chinese and sinology studies research throughout the world. Because of this, Markus Ladstätter agreed to ship what his father took a lifetime to acquire across land and sea to find a new home at NCL.

Dr. Otto Ladstätter has been recognized as one of the earliest sinologists in the Germanophone area of Europe, and indeed of Europe as a whole. In 1961, he earned a Ph.D. in Chinese studies and began his career in teaching Chinese and researching topics related to Chinese studies. He used to teach at Eberhard Karls Universität in Tübingen, which is one of Germany's oldest universities and one of the eleven Universities of Excellence. He later taught at the University of Bonn in Germany. Classes he taught covered classical Chinese poetry, Buddhist studies, Confucian studies, and 17-18th century novels in China. In 1972, the University of Vienna established a Chinese studies department and appointed Dr. Otto Ladstätter as the department head. He taught mostly on contemporary China and modern Chinese. As for his research, he was honored as a pioneer in using the scientific method in researching topics on Chinese studies.

Dr. Ladstätter spent his entire life at the university teaching modern Chinese in universities. He placed much emphasis on scientific research on language and culture through travel and exploration. For example, with regard to researching ethnicities on China's outer regions, he personally traveled to Xinjiang to conduct field studies and observed people's life there, while also gathering a sizable number of materials. With regard to Chinese studies, he felt that further research should be conducted on the religious and ethnic ideologies of related languages. This type of deep research is challenging, and yet Dr. Ladstätter viewed this as his lifetime pursuit in Chinese studies.

The donated books were originally stored in Altlengbach, Austria. It was packed up into 109 boxes on May 11 and then shipped to Hamburg, Germany. There it was put in a shipping container and shipped out on June 11. It arrived in Taiwan on July 19. The donation was broken down into smaller batches to be fumigated and then was shipped to NCL on August 2.

COVID-19 began spreading around the world in 2020. Many international flights and shipments have been stopped or reduced. Because of this, Director-General Tseng stated that it was basically a miracle that this large and much anticipated donation by Dr. Ladstätter could arrive. Due to Dr. Ladstätter's teaching and research interests, the collection is comprised of books on Chinese language teaching in a variety of languages, as well as others on Chinese studies. Director-General Tseng stated that approximately 150 of the books are over one hundred years old, with the oldest being published in 1834. The collection totals around 6,000 volumes, with 2,500 of these being important books and journals in Chinese studies. With such a large donation covering a wide range of subjects, it will be a huge boon to researchers in Taiwan and abroad!

Due to the current COVID-19 pandemic, it is not possible to sign the agreement in person. The signing was done by exchanging the signed documents by postal mail. The pictures of the representatives of both parties holding the signed Cooperation Agreement became rememberable records for the confirmation of this cooperation.

At UZH side, four important representatives jointly signed this Cooperation Agreement including Vice President Faculty Affairs and Scientific Information, Prof. Dr. Christian Schwarzenegger, Dean of Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Prof. Dr. Klaus Jonas, Director of Institute of Asian and Oriental Studies, Prof. Dr. Wolfgang Behr, and Director of University Library Zurich, Prof. Dr. Rudolf Mumenthaler, this fully reveals how much they attach importance to this cooperation project. This is the 36th TRCCS cooperation agreement signed by the NCL with partner institutions abroad.
