Painterly Memories of Taiwan: National Central Library Cherishes Dan-fong Liang's Memory

Professor Dan-fong Liang, a well-known watercolor painter who created artwork throughout her life, passed away on September 6, 2021. Professor Liang was the first female Chinese artist to paint in the Polar Regions, and a pioneer among Taiwanese women who combined personal travel and painting throughout her life. In order to promote aesthetic education, Professor Liang donated all of her 13,970 works and approximately 5,700 manuscripts she created in her whole life to the permanent collection of the National Central Library. This is recognized by Taiwan's literary and art circles as the largest priceless donation.

Professor Liang was born and raised up in a painting family, and she lived and painted in Taiwan for more than 60 years. She left behind a large number of paintings and sketches about Taiwan, ranging from natural landscapes to architecture, characters, and ordinary people's lives, covering great diversity of subjects, rich and exciting. Meanwhile, all the paintings donated by Professor Liang had been digitized and the digital images are preserved in the NCL Contemporary Celebrities' Manuscripts Collection System, searchable and accessible for all people. The beautiful works also had been compiled into a publication Remembering Taiwan: Dan-fong Liang's Formosa Ambience Collection. NCL Director-General Shu-hsien Tseng said that the Library will continue to honor her legacy by well preserve and promote the beauty of the artwork assets she left for us.

Professor Liang not only illustrated the beauty of the world with her paintings, but also treated people with sincerity, integrity and consideration. Therefore, she was greatly and gratefully admired by all of her friends and students.
