LDT @ Library System Announced

National Central Library and National Taiwan University Library created LDT @ Library (Linked Open Data Taiwan) jointly, as announced on March 18, 2022 at National Taiwan University Library. Director-General Tseng and University Librarian Kuang-hua Chen announced its launch together. This database system is an important collaboration outcome from an MOU signed on October 21, 2020. The aim is to promote the cocreation and sharing of Chinese authority data, as well as value-added application developments and expand the influence and international visibility of Taiwan authority resources.

During Director-General Tseng's remarks she said that in the past the creation of library information records relied on MARC standards. Emphasis was placed on the information records and the format of their recording, but little attention was given to the relationship between individual records and others. As such, they were difficult to understand and be accepted by information organizations that were not libraries. This, in turn, influenced the limitations of library information being able to synthesize across disciplines. In recent years, linked data, linked open data, knowledge ontology, and semantic web have all appeared with the aim of linking together library information with web resources (such as Wikidata, ISNI, ORCID, VIAF, etc.). This development will allow patrons or catalog users to search information from a single click to generate considerable information about books on the internet. No longer will one be limited to just one library but will be able to pull together related information in a comprehensive manner for reference or use. In order to achieve this goal, important national libraries throughout the world have made much effort in recent years in developing library linked data services, including the US Library of Congress's LC Linked Data Service, the Bibliothèque nationale de France's BnF Data, and LD4P and Share-VDEmany produced by many university libraries under a collaborative linked data project.

In 2018, NCL began implementing RDA cataloging for Chinese books, and before that in 2015 it had organized Chinese subject standards and authority data, in addition, created the National Central Library Linked Data System. However, it was only for doing searches. It was not yet possible to fully link with the Internet. Over the past few years, NCL has continued to watch worldwide data organization and development trends in the semantic web world. Given that many university libraries in Taiwan began using automated cloud systems, this brought about the rapid development of knowledge organization and linked data in Taiwan; as such, in the beginning of 2021 NCL formally began its collaboration with National Taiwan University Library to create LDT @ Library.

National Taiwan University Library has long been an amazing collaborative partner of National Central Library and has an outstanding information systems team. LDT @ Library brings together NCL's rich and complete Chinese subject classification standards and Chinese authority data, with National Taiwan University Library developing the system, writing the program, transferring and linking data, using NCL's ld.ncl.edu.tw web address as the link resource URI, then both parties decided about the standards for authority and catalog linked resources. Lastly, Director-General Tseng sincerely thanked University Librarian Kuang-hua Chen for his proposal and support, and the assistance of the team at National Taiwan University Library. She appreciated that they ensured the smooth proceed of the project, and hoped that this linked data project could be moved forward soon, having more university libraries join and use the resources provided by this LDT @ Library System.

National Taiwan University's University Librarian Kuang-hua Chen said during his remarks that the development of information technology has tremendously influenced library service practices. National Central Library and National Taiwan University Library have expended a lot of energy in the planning and research of linked data that he wishes this system would well serve the library community.

Invited to this event were staff from National Central Library, National Taiwan University Library, and ExLibris to share their experiences in creating this linked data system. With the two libraries working together, the LDT @ Library was officially and successfully launched. It is anticipated and hoped that the information about books written in traditional Chinese published in Taiwan will soon increase visibilities in the world.
