National Central Library Holds Cultural Visits for Foreign Scholars, with Stops at the Tamsui River and Dadaocheng

In order to enable foreign scholars visiting Taiwan to understand Taiwan's cultural landscape and performing arts culture, the National Central Library invited Taiwan Fellows and scholars holding Taiwan Scholarships from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to participate on November 23, 2022 in cultural visits, calling at the Dadaocheng neighborhood, observing the banks of the Tamsui River, and appreciating the beauty of traditional puppetry. The event was hosted by the Center for Chinese Studies and invited the Department of Policy Planning, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, to jointly lead participants from such countries as Australia, Brazil, Colombia, Honduras, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Japan, South Korea, Latvia, Malaysia, Mongolia, Nigeria, Spain, Sweden, Uganda, the United States, Venezuela, and Vietnam. About 33 scholarship recipients and their families from 19 countries participated.

In order to deepen the scholars' understanding of Taiwanese opera, before watching the performance, the guide teacher of the Taipei Puppet Troupe introduced to each of them the characteristics of each character and each costume, as well as how shadow play should operate. After the tour, hand puppets were also provided to the scholars to enable them to experience how to manipulate them, allowing them to experience personally the delicacy and refinement of traditional performing arts. After they had enjoyed the theater, the visit continued to the Dadaocheng neighborhood, where the scholars combined leisure with study and gained an understanding of the architecture, culture, history, evolution, etc., of the humanistic landscape. After the visit, the scholars said one after the other that they had a deeper feeling for Taiwan's rich history, culture and performing arts, and looked forward to being able to promote the beauty of Taiwan to the world in the future.
