Security Research, Institute for National Defense and Security Research, responded, saying that South Korea's role in supporting Taiwan in times of crisis is indeed limited, but maintaining a free, peaceful and prosperous Indo-Pacific region is conducive to peace and stability in the Taiwan Strait region, and vice versa.

The topic of the third speaker, Dr. Aravind Yelery, Honorary Fellow at the Institute of Chinese Studies, Delhi, was Regional and Subnational Attributes to Reinvent Indo-Pacific. He said that, in relation to Indo-Pacific strategy, because of the intensification of global trade and divergences of national interests, India's trade imbalance with China is daunting and intense so India is seeking a reliable partner. This partnership is expected to help India through a period of economic transition as well as external geo-economic fluctuations. Discussant Dr. Ming-Shih Shen, Acting Deputy CEO for research at INDSR and its Director of the Division of National Security Research, Institute for National Defense and Security Research, said that, economically, each region has its advantages, and these advantages, such as Taiwan's chip technology, India's semiconductor technology, etc., must be irreplaceable, through the reciprocity of economic benefits, to maintain what the presenter had termed "partnership."

The National Central Library's Center for Chinese Studies is charged with administration of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs Taiwan Fellowship, available since 2010, more than 10 years ago. Organizing the Taiwan Fellowship Presentation has provided a channel for exchange of opinions between fellowship recipients and Taiwan academic institutions.
