April 24. The theme " Ideologies and Problems" was taken from Hu Shih's advice to "study problems more and talk about ideologies less." The seminar was hosted by Prof. Kao Cheng-shu of Tunghai University. Speakers included prominent scholars and experts of the May Fourth Movement, including professors Lin Yu-sheng, Chin Kuan-tao, Chou Chang-lung, and Sun Lung-chi, and China Times deputy editor-in-chief Yang Ze. The participants jointly discussed and presented thoughts on the May Fourth Movement.

In addition to the seminar, an exhibition of photographs of May Fourth literary figures was held from May 4 to 31. Adopting the theme of "Rising Youth, Budding Thought," the exhibition was sponsored by the Taipei City Government, Council for Cultural Affairs (CCA) in conjunction with the NCL, with the Taiwan Literature Development Foundation and Wen-Hsun Magazine Publishing Co. in charge of planning and implementation. The opening ceremony for the exhibition was held at the NCL on May 4, presided by Council for Cultural Affairs (CCA) Minister Huang Pi-twan, Taipei City Cultural Affairs Commissioner Lee Yong-ping, NCL Director-general Karl Min Ku, and former CCA Minister Lin Cheng-chi. Over 30 libraries, memorial halls, and collectors in Taiwan and abroad loaned historical items, books, letters, manuscripts and 150 books and periodicals for display during the exhibition, providing a literary and photographic portrait of the May Fourth Movement.

The NCL also arranged lectures on the May Fourth Movement on every Saturday and Sunday between May 9 and 31 at the NCL Briefing Room. The lectures provided various perspectives on the spirit and thought of literary figures during the May Fourth Movement.

Youth Forum on Library Development

Young people majoring in and teaching library and information science will be the cornerstones for the future development of library operations. In order to hear the voices of these future leaders of the library world, the National Central Library commissioned the Library Association of the Republic of China (Taiwan) (LAROC) to plan a "Youth Forum on Library Development" on the eve of the Fourth National Library Conference.

The forum was held at the NCL, hosted by library Director-general Karl Min Ku. Other participants in the forum will include LAROC President Chen Chao-chen, the heads of eight library and information science (LIS) departments and graduate institutes in Taiwan (see list below for details), the presidents of the Chinese Association of Library and Information Science Education (CALISE), Interlibrary Cooperation Association (ILCA), and American Society for Information Science and Technology (Taipei Chapter), and bloggers in the LIS field.

Before the forum, each of the participating schools will first hold a touring symposium on their respective campuses (supervised by LIS teachers): Bloggers (XXC, Ted, Debra, takanula) assisted in hosting the symposiums, which was open to participation by LIS majors. Each school could determine its own symposium topics and carry out discussions in sections or groups. An online youth forum called "Taiwan LIS Forum: LIS ShareLand" was also arranged. The symposiums concluded with a summary report stating the focal issues and topics of interest to young people in the LIS community, as well as suggestions for the most feasible approach to holding the Youth Forum on Library Development. the LIS Community.

- Graduate Institute of Library, Information and Archival Studies, National Chengchi University: March 9 / 10:00~13:00; Discussion topics: Librarian Specialization and Capabilities: What Are Librarians Doing?; and Professional Protections for Librarians.
- Department of Library and Information Science, Hsuan Chuang University: March 10 / 13:00~ 15:00; Discussion topics: Whispering Aloud: How Will Libraries Evolve in the Next Decade?; and How Can Librarians Inform Family and Friends about the Library Profession?


