■ NCL Joins Dalian Symposium on Colonialism in Taiwan

The Symposium on the History of the Colonialism in Taiwan was held in Dalian, China on August 20 to August 23. The symposium was sponsored by the Institute of Taiwan Studies at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences in association with the international relations institute of the Dalian University of Foreign Languages and the research

department of the All China Taiwanese Association. The symposium was held to further promote and coordinate the establishment of the field of Taiwanese historical studies in Taiwan, China and other countries through research and academic exchanges. The symposium also analyzed trends on the historical studies of colonialism in Taiwan from historical perspectives and in context of the historical development of Taiwan.

The symposium was joined by 77 participants, including 38 scholars from China, 26 scholars from Taiwan, and 13 experts and scholars from Japan. Among the 60 papers submitted were studies on Taiwanese politics, economy, military affairs, diplomacy, society, culture, and local historical figures.

After the symposium, the participants were invited on a tour of historic and scenic sites in Lushun and Dalian, including visits to Baiyu Hill, the Lushun Museum, the site of the Lushun Japan-Russia Prison, 203 Highland, and Dongjiguan Fort (site of a major battle during the Russo-Japanese War).
