■ Participation in the 2010 AAS Meeting

The 2010 sixty-second annual meeting of the US Association for Asian Studies (AAS) and its associated book exhibition took place on 25-28 March in Philadelphia. The meeting attracted over 3000 scholars and professionals in the field of Asian Studies from all over the world. There were 133 booths from 93 different academic institutions, organizations, and publishing companies, including NCL, which participated in both the conference and book exhibition as usual. At the book exhibition, NCL primarily presented government-published materials related to Chinese studies in the fields

of the humanities and social sciences from the last three years. The NCL's booth displayed over 352 titles of books and CD/DVD disks, totalling 404 volumes, bringing quality publications from Taiwan to the world stage and placing them in the hands of avid readers. Over the course of the meeting, NCL representatives also made a visit to the historical Philadelphia Public Library and the oldest library organization in the United States, The Library Company.

2010 NBINet Library Partner Meeting

On 31 March, two important annual cataloguing cooperation meetings, the "National Bibliographic Information Network (NBINet) Policy Committee" and the "NBINet Meeting of Collaborating Library Directors" were held at NCL.

This years' meetings awarded certificates of appreciation to the sixty-two cooperating libraries that have shared information with the NBINet over the past three years, and letters were sent to their mother organizations of all NBINet participants be encouraged for their cooperative efforts.

In addition to reports from bibliographic centers, the meeting also invited Soochow University Library Director-general Yuan-Chi Ting to report on the state and operation of her library's "Library Resource Service Platform."

At this year's meeting, Academia Sinica Library was approved to join the NBINet partnership; the library will continually transfer bibliographic data to the NBINet database to become part of the mutually shared data.

Furthermore, during the meeting, a resolution was reached allowing NBInet partners to apply to switch from NCL's CMARC3 to the MARC21 system, aiding libraries to process bibliographic format changes in batches and upload data to OCLC Worldcat.

On 21 April 2010, NCL celebrated it's seventy-seventh year of operation by hosting the "2010 Conference on the Librarianship in the Modern Age" subtitled "Meta-Bibliographic Systems: The foundation of library civilization." The conference was an academic activity focused on research results in the field of "Meta-Bibliographic Systems."

Meta-bibliographic systems are not merely wide-area collections of knowledge media, they also encompass search functions and knowledge navigation; they undertake multimodal functions vis-à-vis social memory, dissemination of information, and comprehensive knowledge management; they ultimately constitute a complete knowledge service system. It is hoped
