of historical research. Over 100 persons were in attendance, including former ambassador to England Dai Ruiming, former head of the Miami Cultural Center Yang Ming-heng, and those that worked on Dai's collected works.

Spanning 27 volumes, the Collected Works took a team of nearly 100 hundred scholars and staff over two years to compile, translate, and edit. This marks the first time all of Dai's writings in Japanese have been translated into Chinese. The content is divided into seven main sections, including nine volumes on historiography and Taiwan studies, three volumes on overseas Chinese and economics, two volumes on Japan and Asia, one on historical figures and history, one on culture and life, one on book reviews and prefaces, nine volumes on interviews and discussions, and one final volume containing pictures, a chronological table, biographical information, and publications.

The Cultural Relics Exhibition of the Dai Guohui Collection displayed 150 items, such as books, documents, rare manuscripts, personal letters, pictures, etc. covering 50 years of history. On special display were several rare documents, books, and maps from the Taiwan Governor-General Office during the Japanese occupation, as well extremely rare books from the Meiji period (1868-1912).

■ National Central Library Donates Books to the Vatican

In September 2010, former director-general Karl Ku visited the Vatican and laid the groundwork for cultural exchange and cooperation. In continuing his efforts, Director-general Tseng has actively sought to establish friendly terms with the Vatican after her appointment by donating Chinese books published in Taiwan to Pontificia Università Urbaniana and the Divine Word Missionaries (Societas Verbi Divini, SVD). The two lots of books were donated via Taiwan's ambassador to the Vatican, Larry Wang.

Books are an integral element in promoting communication between individuals. They can be used as a bridge for cultural exchange between the Orient and Occident. Through them knowledge, experience, and world views can be shared. As a way to further Vatican scholars' knowledge of sinology and Chinese history and culture, the books

donated included many on religion, philosophy, history, and art.


On March 30, a donation was made to Pontificia Università Urbaniana, with university president Cataldo Zuccaro conducting the ceremony. The university's librarian and sinology center director were also in attendance. President Zuccaro thanked National Central Library, as well as Ambassador Wang, in his speech. He stated that this donation of Chinese books would be added their library collection for use by faculty and students. He is certain it will have a direct impact on their understanding of Chinese culture.

National Central Library donated 1,000 Chinese books to SVD in 2007. As a way to expand their collection and augment their studies of things Chinese, NCL made another donated. Assistant Superior General Konrad Keler and 20 other important general councilors attended.

Pernia thanked NCL for donating more books and Ambassador Wang for arranging the donation. He mentioned that while not a large donation, its influence will be widely felt, "just as Taiwan, although small, exercises much soft power on the global stage." He believes these books will directly benefit SVD missionaries in understanding Chinese studies and culture.
