

■ Director General Tseng Visits the Toronto Public Library and York University Library

The Toronto Public Library has a total of 100 branch libraries, the biggest of which is the Toronto Reference Library established in 1909. With 106 years of history it is one of a few libraries that has a Chinese collection. With the assistance of the City of Toronto, the Government of Ontario, the Government of Canada, and the Toronto Public Library Foundation, “a re:vitalize campaign” was put forth. Director General Tseng and accompanying staff made a special arrangement to observe the new facilities and services, including a 3D printer, training and learning spaces, information stations, and a special collections room with two million historic maps, photographs, and original manuscripts from Canada.

There are five libraries at York University, with holdings totaling two million volumes. Director General Tseng and accompanying staff met with York University Librarian Joy Kirchner, Associate University Librarian Catherine Davidson and Mr. Michael B. Moir (University Archivist and Head of Clara Thomas Archives & Special Collections). They also viewed the incunabula and the Alice in Wonderland signed by the author in the library’s special collections.

■ NCL Organizes the “Collection Evaluation: Cross-Strait Conference on Classification and Preservation of Ancient Chinese Books”

For the past twenty years, the collection,

maintenance, promotion of Chinese ancient books, its international cooperation and exchange, maintenance and use are very important issues of the East Asian Libraries worldwide. To promote the training of personnel in related knowledge, and through exchanges, understand the development of cross-strait academic research, the NCL in cooperation with Siyuan Cultural Foundation organized the “Collection Evaluation: Cross-Strait Conference on Classification and Preservation of Ancient Chinese Books” on August 4 and 5 at the NCL International Conference Hall.

During the two-day conference, a total of 21 research studies were presented (of which 9 from Taiwan, 12 from mainland China), and 3 keynote speeches. The opening and closing keynote speakers were National Library of China (NLC) Director Yongjin Han from mainland China, and Director Ming-chu Fung, National Palace Museum, R.O.C. That cross-strait highest directors of documents and relics collection sections delivered keynote speeches on the same venue followed by a comprehensive forum is indeed a rare and significant event loaded with meaning. Furthermore, the coming together of Taiwan and mainland China experts in ancient books identification and evaluation is an astonishingly unusual event. This is the first time in the last decade of cross-strait cooperation that such an important large-scale academic exchange and presentation took place. It would be beneficial to both sides in cultural asset preservation and classification.

Regarding the research on the classification and preservation of ancient books, it not only needs a long-term planning and investment of human resources through mutual exchanges, introduction of new methods and ideas but also interdisciplinary knowledge. This conference co-organized by NCL and Siyuan Cultural Foundation supported by Pan Pacific Group President, Mr. Siyuan Pan. Mr. Pan also provided the NCL staff training in the mainland and overseas as well, strengthening exchange of information on research of ancient books and documents to assist local libraries foster the formation of personnel in the collection of ancient books, in editing, repairing, classifying and publishing thereby fulfilling the libraries’ roles for preserving and promoting ancient books.

■ NCL Holds the “Digital Library” Session of PNC 2015 Annual Conference and Joint Meetings

The “Pacific Neighborhood Consortium” (PNC) is an important international organization which aims in promoting national information exchange and circulation among the countries in the Pacific Rim. The NCL regularly participates in the annual meeting, and organizes the “Digital Library” session, inviting scholars to discuss issues related to the development and sharing in library digitization. This year, the “2015 Annual Conference and Joint Meetings” were held at the University of Macau on September 27-29. Director General Tseng together with two colleagues attended and participated in the poster exhibition. She served as the moderator on “Digital Libraries”.

This year the “Digital Libraries” event was held in the morning of September 28 on the theme “Innovative digital services of academic libraries.” Invited speakers were Prof. Hao-ren Ke, University Librarian of National Taiwan Normal University library; Kwok-keung Wong, Assistant Librarian, University of Macau Library and Editor Chia-ning Chiang from the NCL. They spoke on three topics respectively: “Development of Semantic Digital Library Services with Linked Data,” “The Development of Digital Library of Macau between 2000- 2015,” “TCI [Taiwan Citation Index] : Towards a Rigorous Citation Index.” They also exchanged views with the library professionals worldwide.

This year, NCL two posters were selected for the “2015 PNC Poster Exhibition.” On the last day of the annual meeting, at the closing and awarding ceremony, the poster: “TCI: Towards a rigorous citation index” won the first prize; the poster: “Walking in the Cloud: Value-added Digital Archive for Reading Promotion” received the second prize.

The “Taiwan Citation Index - Humanities and Social Sciences” (TCI-HSS) is a collaborative project of the NCL, the Department of Humanities and Social Sciences, Ministry of Science and Technology and the Science and Technology Policy Research and Information Center. The main object is to establish a comprehensive index platform for academic researchers and public users in the cross discipline of the Humanity and Social Science in Taiwan. The TCI-HSS currently includes Humanities and Social Sciences journals, NCL Theses and Dissertation in Taiwan, monographs with specialized citations contributed by domestic and overseas professionals. To help users understand and learn comprehensive referencing network, building up academic and primary references with diversified search criteria is the prioritized purpose of TCI-HSS.

In recent years, the NCL has been making effort to actively promote its digital services to the public. In drawing on achievements and abundant experience in e-resource services, the NCL has taken steps to increase its digital content, in both quality and quantity, and to further improve its e-resource services. Developments in mobile technology and cloud computing are bases on which e-learning can be further promoted and digital culture and creativity can continue to develop. This plan includes three projects: “The Promotion of the NCL’s Digital Archives Project,” “The Innovative Introduction of e-Resources on Ancient Chinese Rare Books Project,” and “The NCL Book Mall on the Cloud - e-Book ATM Project”.
